The Birth of a TELETHON

How Doña Chiqui and her "Mercy Squad" became a national phenom

hat is an Eggenberger? Ask that question in any other country, and people might think you refer to some new breakfast entrée from McDonalds. And if you then ask, Who is Chiqui de Eggenberger? they might think you refer to the carhop or chica who fills your order for an Eggenberger with fries.

But in Guatemala there is nothing funny about how tire merchant Blanca Lidia Hernández de Eggenberger—her real name—has for 25 years helped the disabled poor of Guatemala to have it their way.

Today Eggenberger, who looks a dozen years short of her real age, is president of the Foundation to Benefit the Disabled. The organization's acronym, Fundabiem, is a household word owing to its July telethon, Guatemala's biggest annual media event. For one weekend, national television hosts a marathon of entertaining pitches and programs, with peeks into a boiler room of volunteers working phones. Individuals normally pledge money while corporations donate logistic support and publicity.

Eggenberger and her friends had no idea where it would lead when, in 1982, they began visiting the sick at the state-run Jorge Von Ahn Hospital. For this "mercy squad" of five professional-class women, the idea was to honor a Biblical imperative to "aid the least of these: feed the hungry, give drink to those who thirst, invite the stranger in, clothe the naked, and look after the sick and imprisoned."

"When we started the visits," she re-

calls, "we found that everyone there needed something the hospital couldn't provide. Medicine, prosthesis, an operation, transportation, or a simple *ayuda* (alm)." Other patients got adequate treatment but relapsed into disability because therapy was unavailable after discharge.

In 1983, the women chipped in to establish the Casa Hogar Niño de Praga for disabled orphan girls. The house was named for a famous statue of Jesus in Prague that was tossed into a rubble heap by Swedish raiders during the Thirty Years War (1618-48), only to be rediscovered and lovingly "rehabilitated" seven years later. At the *hogar*, five girls live as sisters with a caretaker/houseparent. They enter as unwanted children and leave as educated young ladies with a family to cheer them on. Some find work at Fundabiem's headquarters in suburban Mixco, where ground was broken in 1989.

That facility is today Central America's premier therapy center, offering speech and physical therapy, hydrotherapy, special ed, occupational training, counseling, nutrition and prenatal courses and more. The original mercy squad had by this time evolved into a foundation led by Chiqui de Eggenberger. The governing board surprised her in 2000 by naming the facility in her honor.

The Centro Blanca Lidia de Eggenberger was built with proceeds from the first three *teletones* (1986-88). Today it is the event's nerve center as the modern telethon plays out all over Guatemala.

Eggenberger introduced the telethon concept after studying a Chilean model, the only one in Latin America. Today, however, Fundabiem executes the copied telethon and also boasts the region's largest chain of therapy clinics under a single institution. In addition to Casa Hogar and Centro Eggenberger, there are nine other centros, 15 smaller *clinicas* and several once-a-week *puestos*.

These currently serve about 6,500 patients, but the number actually helped is far higher. Patients' families now have help with their burdens, and Fundabiem's 186 ministering angels—career therapists, teachers, physicians, social workers—get paid to do what they most love. Donors, too, benefit because of Fundabiem's financial transparency; from inception, outside auditors have kept the books open to everyone.

Unlike other people who dedicate their lives to *personas discapacitadas*, such as comedian Jerry Lewis and author Joni Erickson Tada, Eggenberger's background held few auspices. No one in her family suffered disability. Nor were her parents and four siblings involved in the care or support of such people.

"Practically speaking," she recalls, "opportunities to see them were rare, since in our society most families with disabled members keep them hidden from view." Such families deny that they have shut-in discapacitados. But when Chiqui Hernández and her siblings encountered such people, they knew they were supposed to help and show respect. "There's no dispossession so great as having nowhere or no one to turn to for help," she says, paraphrasing her idol, Theresa of Calcutta.

A new generation with this outlook can trace its origins to Chiqui's discovery of Carlos Eggenberger at Rafael Landívar University.

"We were both studying economics," she

says. "He was a year ahead of me. But in all, circumstances were ideal for love." Two of the Eggenbergers' three children remained in the United States after finishing college there. "But they grew up watching us do what we could to expand Fundabiem. And they experienced the teletón as a busy holiday."

Carlos Eggenberger today chairs the national Telethon which, along with dozens of local campaigns, generates the bulk of Fundabiem's support. The Eggenbergers' son, Juan Carlos, also sits on the governing board.

Eggenberger has won awards but refuses to list them. "They're not worth mentioning, because none compares with the best rewards we can receive, those from our Lord." She loves listening to Christian music and reading psalms, "in particular Psalm 23, my motto for life."

Apart from Fundabiem and her business, Auto Servicios in Zone 3, Eggenberger makes time for her weekly Catholic prayer group, and "tries to make time" for dancing and books; her favorite author is García Márquez. But she has no plans to pen a book of her own on the ups and downs of leading the Foundation.

"There's really no story," she insists with straight-faced modesty, "except that this had a tiny beginning and evolved into a national phenomenon. But not by my hand. I'm only a partaker."

Yet many doubt that Fundabiem would have emerged without her leadership instincts, sense of timing, and media savvy. These gifts played in tandem in 2006 when the Free Wheelchair Mission of California sought a partner to distribute 453 chairs to people who were both poor and unresponsive to therapy. Fundabiem was not a logical partner, since its mission was betterment through therapy. The clinic directors had no lists of people who would never walk, because such people were not their patients.

Nonetheless, Eggenberger ordered them to find candidates, and in time wheelchairs were delivered with ceremony at each clinic. Nearly 200 were given away in a single pop six weeks after the 2006 Telethon, in front of the National Palace. The venue and timing, Eggenberger explains, was key; just when thoughts of the telethon are fading whoa!—here's Fundabiem, in the papers, doing something else.

The future, Eggenberger hopes, will see more custom-built facilities on land owned by the foundation, like Escuintla's model center. More than half of the current facilities are in "rented buildings, without a home of their own." If the 2008 telethon brings record proceeds, Eggenberger says, then some clínicas might become *centros*. Other facilities might get hydrotherapy pools. Or new clínicas might open in communities that never had one.

And Guatemala, she notes, still lacks an ambulation lab, a battery of diagnostic equipment that could allow Fundabiem angels to anticipate latent disabilities with therapy. "El Salvador, Panama and other countries smaller than Guatemala already have multiple ambulation labs. Can't we have just one?"

She also mentions the state of being *auto-sostenible*, i.e., generating profits that exceed expenses. Charities rarely achieve this, but Fundabiem has taken steps in that direction. Its occupational programs for the disabled (baking, computer education and computer repair) actually generate profits.

But the bulk of revenues will continue to come through the telethon, raffles and newer efforts like "Makki's Kids," a sponsorship program anyone can afford to support (and named for Texan Maxine Bigman, a former Panajachel resident). For under \$6, a padrino can help Fundabiem by paying for a month of therapy for an impoverished patient.

"But all this is not about me or [Makki Bigman] or any other individual," Chiqui de Eggenberger asserts. "God could have raised up another, just as easily."

record when it all began. Maybe a caveman spotted a brightly colored stone while hunting for mammoths. Maybe a cavemom found a brightly colored pebble in a cavekid's laundry.

"It" is mankind's fascination with rocks, now brought to new heights in Guatemala City. In May of this year officials opened the new permanent mining/rock exhibit at Guatemala City's Children's Museum (Museo de los Niños).

Taking a page from San Francisco, California's pioneering Exploratorium Museum, Guatemala has created a hands-on, don't-worry-about-breaking-it exhibition showcasing Guatemala's mineral wealth. Imagine sitting on a moving mine cart, wearing, naturally, a mine safety vest, and having three different flat screens around you transmitting interactive lessons on Guatemala's mining industry.

The museum has three stated objectives:

- To awaken curiosity about the marvelous world of rocks and minerals
- To get to know historically the uses and benefits of mining in Guatemala
- To determine the importance of responsible mining, not only for the environment but also for society

Sponsored by the Mining Trade Asso-

ciation, the Ministry of Energy and Mines, Montana Exploradora (gold), Gentrac, Mayaniquel, Cementos Progreso and CGN (nickel), the museum's exhibit shows kids (and adults) how mined materials play an important role in daily lives in Guatemala. It's not just exotic minerals such as jade, gold and silver that are featured. How about Guatemala's zinc, the key ingredient in galvanized roofing? Or Guatemala's clay, the key ingredient in the country's distinctive red roofs? Or, if you are a student and aren't familiar with the role of gypsum, how about the fact that it is essentially synonymous with the chalk used on blackboards in classrooms? It's all there, "handleable" along with copper, quartz, calcite, volcanic rock and many of the other minerals that make Guatemala one of the world's most geologically diverse countries.

The permanent exhibit draws school-children (and their cave dads and moms) from all over Guatemala. Public school children pay no entrance fee, while students from private schools and individuals and families (discounted family "passports" are available) pay a modest fee, to ensure the museum's sustainability, according to María Inés de la Torre, public relations director for the Museo de los Niños.

Antigua Guatemala Biodiesel Project

he Antigua Guatemala Biodiesel Project is the brainchild of a multi-talented group of young professionals working together to reduce pollution in La Antigua Guatemala. With financial backing from the Swiss embassy in Guatemala, the project will involve restaurants, hotels and the general public of La Antigua to recycle used cooking oil as biodiesel fuel.

Biodiesel has the same characteristics as diesel from petroleum but its combustion produces 87 percent fewer emissions. It lubricates the engine and cleans the fuel injection system, and the characteristic black exhaust soot is also eliminated. It functions cleanly and efficiently in all diesel engines. Biodiesel is a renewable energy source, which is primarily derived from vegetable oils, such as sunflower, palm, soybean pinón and corn.

FROM USED COOKING OIL TO BIODIESEL

New program to recycle used cooking oil as biodiesel fuel backed by Swiss embassy and 137 local businesses.

In April 2007 an agreement was signed between the municipality of La Antigua, the Swiss embassy in Guatemala and Alejandro del Valle Moreno to begin a renewable energy project to benefit the municipality of La Antigua and the Hospital Hermano Pedro Social Works (Hospital de Obras Sociales del Hermano Pedro). Using

biodiesel these two groups with quite different activities and goals are national and perhaps international models.

The project has been structured with one-, five- and 20-year goals, with each phase focusing on the processes and technology for producing and using this renewable energy.

This project so far has the support of 137 restaurants and hotels in La Antigua and Guatemala City, which donate their used cooking oil. An average of 450 gallons per

week are collected—450 gallons per week that are not contaminating our waterways and aquifers. The production area is located in Florencia Ecological Park (Parque Ecológico Florencia) at Km. 21.5 on the highway to La Antigua. This area is open to the public to educate and motivate Guatemalans to become involved in producing and using renewable energies.

This is how an idea becomes a reality for people seeking solutions to environmental problems. We are especially grateful to the business people and other participants who have believed in our project. Thank you! And we hope to count on your permanent support.

I Care, We Care for Eye Care

Massive five day optical-health fair in Panajachel brings an eye-opener for 1,800 vision-impaired locals

ost of those who came to Guatemala's grandest-ever eye jornada were born in a war zone or in its cooling aftermath. Some were refugees daring to re-don traditional garb that was once considered subversive. Some had rarely even seen eyeglasses, much less seen through them; the eye-tingling splendor of the Western Highlands was for them as much a blur as had been, for years, the hope of peace.

Peace has its dividends, and war, its levies; one levy was a stunt on progress so acute that in 2006, 10 years after the close of the 35-year civil conflict, all of Sololá province lacked a single optometrist. Today there are four and, for one week in April, triple that. They, and a company of other volunteers, brought light into eyes dimmed by war and its lingering privations. One did not need a month's wages—nor even a minute's—to own glasses.

The health-fair idea began with Dr. Patricia Cole, headmistress of Panajachel's experimental Chinimayá school, and her friend, Chicago optometrist Philip Ortiz. Dr. Ortiz is the co-founder of ICareInternational, a California-based foundation that dispatches optometrists, surgeons, support personnel—and mounds of eyeglasses—to wherever they are needed in Latin America.

Trip organizer Lance Kinney, who chronicles ICare missions with his camera, was personally recruited by Ortiz while doing contract work on the latter's house. "I asked Phil what he did. When he told me

about his ICare teams, I enlisted." Like everyone else, Kinney had to travel light to Guatemala in order to leave room for his share of glasses.

Social worker Dave McClure, a 20-year veteran of ICare jornadas, was another personal convert. "I grew close to Phil, my own optometrist, after getting a cornea transplant. I discovered that he was making these trips on his own nickel, helping people who otherwise had no hope of seeing well. So I started going along." McClure's role is operating a gadget that identifies the parameters of donated eyeglasses.

ICare collects tens of thousands each year, more than they can give away. Some come through the Goodwill and the Salvation Army; others are seconds, discontinued styles, or "blems" (perfectly functioning frames with minor flaws).

"The average retail for eyeglasses is \$150," says Dave's wife, Colleen. "But on this trip we've given away Christian Dior, Prada, Calvin Klein and the like, for which the frames alone cost \$400."

Colleen's coworker, Laura Gekeler, says the important thing is "seeing joy spread over the face of someone who's seeing well for the first time in years—or the first time ever—whatever the frames are worth." The volunteers have seen people marvel at seeing things like clouds for the first time.

In addition to prescription glasses, sunglasses and reading glasses were given out. "They'll help farmers who toil at high altitudes," Dave says, "where ultraviolet radiation is intense." He adds that reading glasses were also given to women who cannot read "but have to thread needles for their livelihoods."

Every volunteer could recall memorable cases. Optometrist Chuck Tribbey treated a child who could resolve nothing beyond her arm's length. And there was a teacher "who was so farsighted, I don't know how she was able to teach." Both were helped.

Megan Chilton, majoring in international relations, noted that "kids and adults are always happy with their glasses. They're not self-conscious. But teenagers often are, and we've seen some reject free glasses because they're too big. They'll settle for a smaller, better-looking pair, even if the prescription is a little off." For unlettered patients, Chilton's eye-chart station featured charts of arrows, fingers, pitchforks and high-pitched houses all "pointing" in a cardinal direction.

Ron and Michelle Reed, an Illinois couple helping out with logistics, recounted one case that needed a second take. "An elderly gentleman received his first-ever glasses," Ron says, "but seemed disappointed as he left. He returned the next day with a letter typed by his son, saying that the glasses gave him headaches and eyeburn."

"Sure enough," Michelle says, "they weren't at all in line with his exam results. So we found some that were. They were huge and ugly. But this time the guy left happy and excited."

High-school seniors Danny Brooks, Matt Margolis and Stephanie Riley, manning the autorefraction station, were touched by 7-year-old Madalín. "She was so thrilled with us, and her glasses," Margolis says, "that she 'adopted' us and hung out with us for most of a day."

"She went around hugging the volunteers," Riley adds. Brookscontinued on page 120

he ruins of the Convent of Santa Clara, on 2a avenida at 6a calle in La Antigua Guatemala, present to the visitor today a mere illusion of the colonial convent. "In the 1940s debris was cleared and bougainvillea planted... The present overall appearance, though very attractive indeed, is hardly what the cloister looked like in the 18th century," wrote Sidney Markman (Colonial Architecture of Antigua, 1966).



Santiago de Los Caballeros, now La Antigua, already had seven monasteries and three convents for women in 1693, when license was granted for founding the Clarisas order in Guatemala. Although this was getting expensive for the town, the Franciscans had processed the paperwork, and the bishop himself sent an envoy to Mexico to advocate for approval. He then poured "all his energies into bringing to a happy finish the organization of the new monastic order," according to Valentin Abascal (Santiago de Los Caballeros de Goathemala, 1961). Such enthusiasm seems curious compared to the struggles of some earlier orders to establish themselves in the seat of the Spanish Kingdom. It might have had something to do with the donation of houses and a large piece of prime property by a wealthy, widowed noblewoman, who left everything she had for an endowment to maintain the order.

The enthusiasm continued. Six Clarisa nuns left Puebla, Mexico in October 1699 to head for Guatemala, and in December an official delegation ushered them from Patzún to the convent of La Concepción, founded by nuns from Mexico more than 100 years before, to await ceremonious installation in

temporary housing of their own convent in January. Five nuns, one having died in the meantime, and two novices were received "with great jubilation, joy of fireworks and ringing of bells," wrote Abascal.

Construction of a facility for 46 nuns, as allotted by the order, began in 1703 and was ready in 1705. There were rooms for a novitiate and, according to books of the municipality, the convent also "served for reclusion of women processed for grave misdeeds." (Abascal) The church, funded by the bishop himself, was completed in 1715.


Then disaster struck. Damage by earthquake in 1717 sent the nuns to Comalapa for 17 years waiting for repairs. Original construction had only taken two years. True, repair and rebuilding were going on all over town, putting a strain on resources of every kind. Also true, lands belonging to the Clarisas had been damaged, cutting their income. But, interestingly, a request in 1721 to found the Capuchin convent, believed impossible due to the major rebuilding, was approved in 1725. The request was made by the same bishop who had support-

ed the Clarisas and was perhaps dealt with urgently. He died the same year.

Repairs began in 1723, then stalled. Pleas for funding on behalf of the Clarisas were sent to the king, and construction resumed. Again, it could have something to do with a private donation, which had become a familiar refrain. Although records are unclear, there may have been plans for expansion even before 1717, which could also explain the delay. The final convent was considerably larger than the original, indicating complete reconstruction.

The spacious facility seen today suggests comfortable rooms for the nuns and a plan that protected their reclusion. The cold but blackened chimney of the kitchen and stone benches of the dining room testify to the life that was there. An empty window seat may have been enjoyed by a long-ago nun, looking out to gardens that lined the east side of the arcaded cloister.

The church formed the west wall. Deli-

cate plaster curls fill the elegant façade on the south and hug the angel-occupied niches. Such artistry surely was not meant to be hidden behind a convent reclusion wall, but that's what happened. More likely, it was meant to crown a fine, open front plaza that extended south to 7a calle, toward the San Francisco Church a stone's throw to the southeast. Whoops! According to a letter dated April 1733, changes were made to answer conventual complaints that "grave errors had been committed in the construction of the church." (Markman)


The unnecessary door in that façade was sealed, which provided a lower as well as an upper choir for the nuns, and an octagonal window inserted instead. The nuns entered directly from the cloister, from an enclosed corridor that ran alongside the nave on the east. The corridor also had entries to five confessionals built into the walls of the church.

Typical of convent churches, two main entrance doors were cut into the west, side wall of the church. The elaborate Baroque helps to break the austerity of the stone veneer and false mortar, a style used also on the City Hall.

Excitement returned for inauguration of the new church in 1734, with a procession that included the new bishop, the town council, royal representatives, nobles and religious congregations. The Franciscans were followed by the Mercedarians, carrying the image of Santa Clara with the royal eagle in her hands.

But even the smart, earthquake-resistant, squatty columns couldn't protect the Santa Clara Convent from catastrophe again in 1773. The nuns fled their convent, having had enough of earthquakes, and re-established themselves in the new capital of Guatemala City three years later.

Private construction in 1800 usurped the front plaza of the abandonedcontinued on page 84

Jictory! One can almost hear the exuberant burst of Handel's Hallelujah Chorus at first view of the new mural in San Francisco el Grande Church in La Antigua Guatemala. The confidently outstretched arms of Jesus Christ emerged from the empty burial crypt upstage those of current political or Olympic races. "The water that flows to the pool below represents life," explains artist Rosamaría Pascual de Gámez. "The monstrance stands boldly as the sacramental presence."

Another mural in the church by the artist illustrates the life of Saint Francis of Assisi. A third work by Rosamaría in La Antigua, in the church of San Pedro Apóstol, portrays the social work begun by Saint Hermano Pedro in the 17th century and the work today that follows his example. The new work, ti-

tled *The Resurrection*, hangs in the front south chapel directly opposite the chapel and tomb where the remains of the saint rest.

When Father Damián Muratori commissioned the work in December 2007, he requested a 'modern mural', one that speaks of reality today. "The theme was to be victory of life over death and the triumph of good over evil, but always in the present context. I did not know if I could accomplish that," reflects Rosamaría. "I stared at the empty canvas prayerfully and decided I just had to plunge in and start!" Given the theme, "It would be great to have it for Easter," she thought. So she did the math and gave herself two weeks for each section. The work was unveiled on Palm Sunday.

of the overall Children's Museum, located on 5a calle 10-00, zone 13 in Guatemala City (tels. 2475-5076 to 79), a street increasingly known as Museum Row, housing also the national museum of archaeology and anthropology. The overall museum also features hands-on, Guatemala-specific exhibits. Did you ever stand in a small house, push a button and trigger a Richter-5.5 earthquake as part of learning what to do and what not to do during Guatemala's infrequent shakes? And then build your own house anti-seismically? Where does Guatemala's trash go? Where does the water come from? These-and a scaled-down city road scene where kids drive "cars" and are cited by "police" for infractions—are all part of the airy museum complex. The name of the scaled down city? Of course, it is "Chiquitenango."

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By the way, I am indebted to Dr. Sam Bonis, a geologist who has worked all over Guatemala for 51 years, for the answer to this tantalizing question. "What is Guatemala's most valuable rock/mineral?" The answer, and surprisingly enough shiploads are going to the United States: gravel.



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
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

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The **Zen** of Q and A

Periodically, I remind readers that the study of English is a proposition at least as zenny as the study of Spanish. Think, for instance, how "contest" can mean one thing as an adjective and something else as a noun. And once the poor student of English grasps this, he must next distinguish adjective from noun by stressing the correct syllable, with no help from spelling. Otherwise, he will sound off-key as the emcee of the school talent *kuhn-TEST*.

Not only that, but contest is a false cognate of *contestar*, which is accordingly false for us. To contest a will (for instance) is *disputar el testamento*. OK, so what does contestar itself mean? Surprisingly, it is one of many nuanced words for "to reply/respond/answer."

Responder also exists, but is apparently favored for verbal responses as opposed to reactions. The kind of responding that a formerly comatose patient does is reaccionar, which also works for reacting from provocación. Contestar seems preferred to responder when the reply is connected with obligation, or even duress. Responder is better for lighter or voluntary replies, such as answering email or raising your hand in class.

Contestar overlaps with *contradecir*, which means what it looks like (to contradict). But is also that thing which I dare never do with my mother-in-law: to "talk back" (although, as a former snotnose, I



practiced amply with school principals, to the point of achieving expert status).

Now this clutch of verbs (contestar, responder, reaccionar, disputar, contradecir, etc.) looks daunting. Happily, a single word, respuesta, works for all of them as the associated noun (reacción, solución, and other "answer words" tend to closely — and blessedly — mirror their English cognates). A respuesta can be an answer in any context. The only noun I've ever personally confused it with is repuesto meaning "replacement part." But even a repuesto can be a respuesta to a question about a broken appliance. I remember which is which by recalling that answer and respuesta both have s as the third letter, whereas repuesto and replacement don't.

So much for answering; what about questioning?

There is *interrogar*, which, like its English cognate, is about questioning with some compulsion; in the Q and A equation, it is opposite to contestar.

Preguntar is the main verb for questioning and asking (unless you are asking for, or requesting, in which case you need pedir). A two-edged modismo is preguntar por, which means both "to ask about/after" (as in Pepe preguntó por ti) and "to ask to see or speak to someone" after the phone or door





is answered (as in *Siempre preguntábamos* por *Pepe en la cantina*). I doubt that this phrase existed a century ago; perhaps it is Spanglish that entered the language proper, courtesy of some underqualified translator; consequently, preguntar is beginning to overlap with pedir.

Hacerle una pregunta, however, was probably around before the Moors invaded Spain around 700 AD. It means to pose or ask a question. Le hice al Señor Mago unas preguntas de la gravedad. (I asked Mr. Wizard some questions about gravity).

Obviously, then, *pregunta* is the associated noun. It is indeed the usual word for question, but I've noticed that the word for doubt, *duda*, often works for questions. If you hear someone say, "Tengo unas dudas," it's likely a polite request for clarification. If accepted, a series of questions (*dudas*) will ensue. It's not, as it potentially is in Eng-

lish, a challenge to the person addressed, as when the prosecutor said, "You mean to tell me, Joey, that you don't know Amy Fisher? I have some doubts!"

For Star trek "Siglo 30" fans, the zenny translation of Captain Kirk's "I want some answers!" includes no answer word, but a question word: ¡Tengo algunas dudas!

The noun *cuestión* exists, but is limited to questions requiring solutions rather than replies, such as philosophical or political riddles, or child custody disputes. *La cuestión de los curdos* (the Kurdish Question). And "It's a question of ..." translates straightforwardly as *Es una cuestión de* (*perseverencia*, *tiempo*, etc.).

In the Internet age, Spanish, English and other major languages converge in *FAQ*. One question that I like to pretend is a FAQ is "Will "Zen of" continue?" The respuesta is in next month's Revue.

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

church, squeezing in on the church façade. A third large, impressive doorway in the west wall seems to be from that construction. The *cúpula* fell in 1874, killing a family that had found a home in the nave of the church. (Pardo, Castellanos, Muñoz, *Guía de Antigua Guatemala*, 1969) In 1936 colorful tiles of a fountain were taken to be reassembled in a courtyard of the Palace of the Captains General.

"Except for the two-story arcade of the main cloister, little of the convent remains today," wrote Markman in 1966, but the quake in 1976 further felled the second level.

In the 1980s the Council for the Protection of La Antigua Guatemala carried out restoration work, reawakened the lovely convent and opened it to the public. The grand church remains roofless above and keeps an extensive crypt below. Perhaps the spirits live on.



Tiles of fountain, once near cloister kitchen, now adorn fountain in courtyard of Palace of Captains General.



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

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


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




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
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
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












Stephanie Riegel, who left a legacy of patrimony for thousands of families too poor to own a camera or hire a photographer, lost her struggle with breast cancer last month. The Ohio native was 69.

"Stevie," as she was known to neighbors in Panajachel, came to Guatemala in 1993 with her first husband, photographer Dan Waldorf, who himself had been Stevie's own mentor in the craft. After they settled in San Andrés Semetabaj, near Lake Atit-lán, Stevie began photographing local folk and giving them copies of the photos.


Waldorf's 1996 death coincided with the digital revolution in photography. This might have been a barrier for Stevie, a selfdescribed computer-phobe. But it was then that she met her next partner, Bay Stater Jerry Smith, who survives her. Smith's technical genius and Riegel's artistic prowess were perfect complements, and the couple generated tens of thousands of exquisite photos of Guatemalan subjects, under the joint credit of "Smith & Riegel." Some graced the covers of Revue, Crónica, and other media.

One thing Stevie did to assure authenticity was to lean on a building near her subjects until they stopped noticing her and returned to their natural composure. Next she "chatted them up" until taking their picture became the natural thing to do. Then she asked if they would be in the same place a week later and, …continued next page

if so, she reappeared to hand out free enlargements of the images snapped on the first visit. Jerry Smith joined her, and they became so familiar around Lake Atitlán that children flocked after them. Those same children will have something to show their children and grandchildren.

Stevie exhibited no bitterness or selfpity during her five-year duel with illness, which included frequent radiotherapy. In the final weeks, when the prognosis was hopeless, she maintained the sweetness and graciousness that had made her a favorite among expats and Guatemalans alike. But she spent her final hours in Austin, Texas, surrounded by her children, David, Donald and Justine, and her grandson, John.

"She had the heart of a lion," Smith recalls.
Stepahanie Riegel immortalized herself, and her adopted country, in her work. She will be missed.

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

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

central figures of the triumphant Christ, the brilliant monstrance and the flowing water. The lower right scene shows the misery of massacres of the 1980s. Pointing to details, Rosamaría explains: "There the men carry coffins; skulls and bones remind of the exhumations even now; a church and houses burn in the background.

"Many people would prefer to forget those years, but we cannot pretend it never happened. One native lady said to me, 'Thank you for including the suffering of our people in your painting.'"

At the lower left the artist illustrates the pain of poverty and current social ills. "There is a boy picking through the garbage and one sniffing drugs; a young girl is pregnant. There is an old man begging; another lies drunk; another hauls a load on his back. Their pots are broken, like their lives; and

this background also is burning."

Rosamaría brightens as she focuses on the upper two scenes. "Here are bread and books and a bicycle. There are kites and huipiles. The children are studying, playing, enjoying water. Smiling people are working the land, harvesting corn and wheat, buying and selling, making tortillas; the landscape is green. This half shows the return of life."

Does the mural reflect reality of today? Yes and no. The massacres, hopefully, are a thing of the past. Misery of life in the garbage dump continues. The apparent health and happiness in the upper scenes illustrate promise of a truth of which Rosamaría is unshakeably sure: Good and life do ultimately triumph. "It is the truth of the Beatitudes. The humble, those who mourn, the pure in heart, the peacemakers—theirs is the gift of well-being, of spiritual joy."

The mural of 75 square feet awaits framing. It is the 16th donated by Rosamaría for churches in Guatemala. Others are in Guatemala City, Cobán, Quiché and Rabinal.



The Beauty Myth

Everywhere we go, we are surrounded by the beauty myth—in television, cinema, fashion magazines, the catwalk and even department store mannequins. Wannabe beauties promenade during the day and synchronize to the beat of strobe lights by night. For clothes "less is more" and for adornments "more is more." Just like the proverb, "Beauty is 10, nine of which is dressing."

Society is fixated on beauty with the clear message, "to be less than beautiful is a failure."

The tyrant ego pushes us to become more beautiful, and the tortuous mind constantly tells us that we'll never make it. We're too fat, our nose is too pointed, our eyes are too far apart and we're getting old.

Unfortunately, despite the glaring flaws, we are caught in the web of this beauty myth.

The one-dimensional, social-cultural view of beauty—physical appearance—traps us.

The other trap is the gender bias. As Kinky Friedman said, "Beauty is in the eye of the beer holder."

This is well illustrated in a recent interview between the 11th in line to the English throne and his new bride. When asked what attracted him to her he replied, "It was her stunningly good looks." She responded, "It was his good humor and kind nature."

Confucius said, "Everything has its beauty, but not everyone sees it." When we open our eyes we can see that true beauty lies beyond the obvious. John Ruskin said, "The most beautiful things in the world are the most useless: peacocks and lilies."

Send the ego on a Caribbean cruise and switch the mental button off. Drop the endless pursuit of physical beauty and open your eyes to the beauty within you. Our bodies encase our spirit, where all beauty lies. As Kahlil Gibran said, "Beauty is not in the face; beauty is a light in the heart."

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
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Question: Is it true that we can catch a cold or the flu and other diseases from our pets? Also, is it true that dog saliva is cleaner than human saliva?

Answer: Cold and flu viruses are species specific, meaning the common human cold cannot be passed to your pet, or vice versa. Campylobacter and Salmonella can pass from dogs and cats to humans, but only through fecal contamination, hand to mouth. However, reptiles (such as turtles and snakes), baby chicks and ducklings, as well as "pocket pets" (hamsters and mice) present a much greater Salmonella risk.

Dog saliva is just as contaminated as human saliva, so it is not a good idea to let your dog lick your mouth especially if you are immune-compromised. Also, be careful not to get pet saliva in an open wound.

Even if a pet is not sick (or doesn't appear sick), it may still harbor organisms that can infect humans. The bacteria that cause catscratch disease, for example, can be passed

from an infected cat with no signs of illness through a bite or scratch. Leptosporosis, a less common but more serious bacterial disease, can be passed from the urine of an infected dog into human mucous membranes. It is also possible to get a fungal disease (ringworm) from contact with the skin of an infected dog or cat. And toxoplasmosis, a parasitic disease, can be transmitted from cats through feces, though a more common source is contaminated meat or soil.

Even with all of the above, please remember that you are far more likely to get sick from another person than from your dog or cat. But, you should still take precautions with you pets, especially if you have a weakened immune system or are otherwise at high risk (frail, elderly people, pregnant women and young children). Always wash your hands after handling pets and cleaning up after them, get pets vaccinated and dewormed, control fleas, and take your pet to the vet for regular checkups. ----

remembers a man who, at 94, was "too old for treatment. But he at least got sunglasses."

Duane and Eunice Wakeman, married 57 years, have volunteered for 14 ICare expeditions. They are, they say, the high point of their retirement. They brought their daughter, Sue Bea, on this one. Sue and coworker Joan Sable managed a database of the eyeglass inventory. Whenever glasses were given away, Sue and Joan deleted them from the database.

"The important thing is seeing joy spread over the face of someone who's seeing well for the first time in years—or the first time ever."

"We don't find a perfect match for everyone," admits Sable, "so we give the closest we have. Sometimes, we find we have the lens for the right eye, and another for the left—but on *different* frames."

In such cases, it is often possible to mate the lenses into one of the original frames, or into another, in spite of differing shapes or dimensions. For this there is a frypan full of seasalt where frames are heated to malleability for refitting. Lenses, too, can be modified on the spot by filing. Frame arms can be recurved, to fit their new owners.

Klaus Schumann, a German lawyer who immigrated to the United States and became a truck driver, spent part of every day for three months prior to the jornada sorting the glasses. They are always indexed by the right lens, then divvied further according to refractive parameters. At the end of the jornada, Schumann and wife Jay turned over some 2300 undelivered eyeglasses to the Lake Atitlán Rotary Club, whose president, Rufino Caniz, began pondering his task: to find owners. "It won't happen

quickly," Jay says, "because some of the glasses are for relatively weird prescriptions. But there're still many for people with commoner vision problems."

Before the event, Rotarians distributed flyers and posters and asked local mayors to inform their townfolk of the jornada. One Rotarian business, Panajachel's El Horno Bakery, donated a day's worth of meals to the volunteers and provided another three days at cost. Seven sharp students of English from nearby Del Valle University showed up to translate. Some Atitlán expats also entered the translating fray.

"Foreigners who live here need to give something back," says American Myron Klein, of Santa Cruz. "That's why I'm here." Klein's presence was rewarded in a special way. "A nice seamstress who did work for me 25 years ago popped up in one of the lines. She remembered me, if not my name."

The jornada ran nearly five days, with most of the first spent logging symptoms and identifying surgery candidates. Over the week, surgeons led by Dennis Deters performed 46 operations in Sololá's public hospital, with Guatemalan medical students assisting. Another ophthalmologist, Roger Ewald, remained at the jornada site to evaluate additional candidates and perform post-ops of the work of his colleagues laboring in Sololá.

The hospital also received a donation of a \$250,000 Alcon Phaco Emulsifier, a surgical appliance from Vantage Technology, where Dr. Deters' wife, Ann, is CEO. The gift puts this provincial hospital on the map of vanguard treatment.

The event's most compelling volunteer might have been retired optometrist Lenny Sable, who filled in wherever needed. Dr. Sable wore a paper Burger King crown all week, and encouraged and entertained everyone with his self-effacing humor. On the final day, he won a kiss from a young translator.

"I can't wait to come back," he said.

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




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
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he Comasagua-Talnique range is located a half hour from the Pacific beaches of La Libertad, San Blas and El Sunzal and a half hour from San Salvador, the busy capital of El Salvador.

With an elevation of 1,250 to 1,500 meters above sea level and an eternal, spring-like climate, this region offers local and international tourists a wonderful option that boasts impressive landscapes, fine food, music, arts and crafts, and in abundance—a pristine natural environment.

Organic farming quickly spread to neighboring coffee farms such as La Giralda, Las Quebradas and San Antonio. It was this effort that inspired Miguel Araujo and his wife Carmen Irene to create—within the La Giralda farm—the first privately-owned nature reserve in El Salvador that included a scientific investigation of the biodiversity of the mountain range. Of the 520 bird species in El Salvador, over 220 species have been registered at the nature reserve. Later Miguel Araujo





accepted the challenge to be the first Minister of Environment in El Salvador and to become an advocate for local environment as well as that of all of Central America.

The Comasagua-Talnique range has also been attracting artists for years. The famous painter Licry Bicard and her husband, later converted this inspirational place to her new home.

The 2001 earthquake was especially devastating in this area and it temporarily halted creative development for several years. But some three years ago, activity began picking up with the Finca San Ernesto's new small zoo and rescue center for endangered species. Accompanying this awakening came the first cabins for rent in the area of Bello Atardecer, led by Salva-

doran publicist Hermann Bruch.

Then in December 2007, the Mirador de la Giralda opened its doors. Proprietors Miguel and Carmen Irene Araujo wanted to offer visitors an interesting mix of original gourmet dishes, spectacular views and cultural activities. Each visitor to the restaurant receives a personal and warm welcome.

The exquisite combination of cool climate, amazing views and the biodiversity of the Comayagua-Talnique mountain range has created the ideal base for increased tourism in the area.

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Records Smashed at Salvadoran Coffee Auction

In an auction that lasted over seven hours, 36 of the best Salvadoran coffee lots, totaling 104,500 pounds of green coffee, were sold recently in one of the most successful regional auctions this year.

The El Salvador Cup of Excellence 2008 electronic auction in April smashed three records. The first was a historic high price of \$20.10 (USD) per pound of raw coffee by Finca La Ilusión from Santa Ana, the first-place winner in the competition. The previous high price of \$17.04 per pound was obtained in the 2006 by Finca Los Planes from Chalatenango. The second record was the average selling price, which reached \$5.36 per pound, surpassing the average


price of \$5.18 reached last year, despite 13 more lots participating in the auction this year. The third record was the dollar total, which reached \$557,987.58, surpassing by more than \$150,000 the previous high in 2006. The auction was also transmitted live via internet among all bidders.

This success reflects the work done to raise quality awareness in the specialty coffee market. Ricardo Espitia, the Salvadoran Coffee Council's executive director, said: "In recent years we have seen coffees from El Salvador regaining their prestige in select markets through several efforts but with far greater resonance in recent months."

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














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
